Faces and names are forgotten.... Personalities undergo changes.... Someone who was always happy may frequently become angry. Unfortunately, many elderly suffer from dementia. This can be a very difficult time not only for the individual but for the family. The physician tells you that your loved one has Dementia or Alzheimer's disease, but what does that mean?

Dementia refers to a category of diseases that cause loss of memory and deterioration in other mental functions. Dementia occurs due to physical changes in the brain and is a progressive disease, meaning it gets worse over time. For some people, dementia progresses rapidly, while it takes years to reach an advanced stage for others. The progression of dementia depends greatly on the underlying cause of dementia. While people will experience the stages of dementia differently, most people with dementia share some of the symptoms. There are many types of dementia some of the more common ones are: Alzheimer's Disease, Vascular Dementia, Frontotemopral Dementia, Parkinson's disease dementia, Dementia with Lewy Bodies, and Mixed dementia to name just a few. There are over 50 diseases that may cause dementia. Treatments for dementia depend on the many different causes. But there are drug treatments that may temporarily improve symptoms. The same medications used to treat Alzheimer's are among the drugs sometimes prescribed to help with symptoms of other types of dementias. The Alzheimer's Association is a wonderful resource not only for written resources, but they are also available to come to the nursing home for a consultation for families. They can also observe the individual and offer suggestions to the staff about providing care.

Dementia help and support are available. If you or a loved one has been diagnosed with dementia, you are not alone.
